A Message from the Pastor

Seventh Sunday of Easter: The Kingdom Remains

We have commemorated Jesus Ascending into heaven and now our focus is upon the Spirit. Today's First Reading begins by giving us a time frame. The events take place during the days between Christ's Ascension and Pentecost. We're in the same point in our liturgical year. On Thursday we celebrated His being taken up in glory and next Sunday we will celebrate His sending of the Spirit upon the Church.

Jesus' prayer in the Gospel today also captures the mood of departure and the anticipation. He is telling us today how it will be when He is no longer in the world. By His Ascension, the Lord has established His throne in heaven, as we sing in today's Psalm. His kingdom is His Church, which continues His mission on earth.

Jesus fashioned His kingdom as a new Jerusalem and a new house of David. He entrusted this kingdom to His Twelve Apostles, who were to preside at the Eucharistic table and to rule with Him over the restored twelve tribes of Israel. That's why it is crucial to replace Judas, so that the Church in its fullness receives the Spirit at Pentecost.

Peter's leadership of the Apostles is another key element of the Church as it is depicted today. Notice that Peter is unquestionably in control, interpreting the Scriptures, deciding a course of action, even defining the nature of the apostolic ministry. No one has ever seen God, as we hear in today's Second Reading. Yet, through the Church founded on His Apostles, the witnesses to the resurrection, the world will come to know and believe in God's love, that He sent His Son to be our savior.

Through the Church, Jesus' pledge still comes to us; that if we love, God will remain with us in our trials and protect us from the evil one. By His word of truth He will help us grow in holiness, the perfection of love. The Church is our route to that Perfection; we now live in that love.

GK Chesterton wrote, "One of the most RENTWAL necessary and most neglected points about the story called history is the fact that the story is not finished."

Looking at our World, our Country, our Diocese, our Family, we may be tempted to feel like all is done and lost. There is a temptation to hear and see things only the way that we want them to be the "golden era." We may group all the situations together and view every crisis or bad feelings as the same. My observation is that by and large today most, especially the Media and those who have a bully pulpit, seem to project one's own dark thoughts, emotions, and motives onto others. I keep hearing that we are being "gaslighted" or that we just don't understand. This is our story, OUR story.

Don't forget the most important part of history --God became man, and left us an unshakeable and objective truth, that He won. He didn't even leave us alone when He Ascended. God has not forgotten us or lost us. God and His teachings have not changed. We are His people, each made in His likeness and image.

The story is not finished. In many ways it has just begun. We have the Scriptures, the traditions, and a wonderful charter called the Church, which has faced all this and more before. Let me bring this back to us and the reason for this column each week. We have been given a challenge to address in our Church: some from without, lawsuits and civil laws; some from within, lower number of priests and individuals' personal faith crises. But we have a God who loves and gave us an example...love one another.

All our history, all our memories, all our traditions and teachings are what help us to go right. I dare say, we have a great role to play today, now, in our World, in our Country, in our Church, in our Diocese. in our Family. Let us stay focused on conforming our hearts to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Christ: to love as He has asked, to focus as our Road to Renewal has asked us, to equip ourselves to serve the poor, visit the imprisoned, welcome the lost sheep and bring souls to heaven with us.

Memorial Day at Holy Cross Cemetery

Whenever Memorial Day approaches, many thoughts turn to renewing and beautifying grave sites with flowers and adornments for the purpose of honoring loved ones. It has become almost a ritual to take advantage of the warming trend of spring in maintaining an attractive resting place for those who reside in one's memory.

The Rev. Thomas Caraher, Most Precious Blood's pastor in the 1870s, purchased the land on the Brant Angola Rd. for the cemetery. In 1879 the first burial in Holy Cross Cemetery took place. Adjacent property (Section B) was acquired and dedicated in 1904, doubling the size of the original site (to almost two acres). Additional land (Sections C, D and E) was purchased in 1955 increasing the site to 6.3 acres.

Over the years an "army" of caretakers have protected and preserved the quality and beauty of Holy Cross Cemetery. Although drainage and other corrective projects have attempted to maintain its original attractiveness, Nature, sometimes violent, and the passage of time have had their way. Often damages overpower the ability to renew and repair, and to meet costs that are increasing and accruing.

Memorial Day is Monday, May 27. Mass on that day will be celebrated at Holy Cross Cemetery at Noon. Traditionally, all veterans buried at the cemetery are remembered at this Mass. Their names are read aloud to honor them and their special service to the nation. (In March 2021, interments at the cemetery numbered 2,427 of which 362 were U.S. veterans.)

As stated in a cemetery brochure: Holy Cross Cemetery provides dignified burial places for the faithfully departed. Services and facilities are offered in harmony with the teaching of the Church and show such care that reflects the spiritual values inherent in the tradition of Catholic burial.
